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## What we are here for

Pelvic Radiation Disease (PRD) is defined as one or more ongoing symptoms that affect people who have previously had radiotherapy in the pelvic region to treat any cancer. PRD can affect one or more of: bladder, bone, bowel, nerves, sexual organs, blood supply, stomach and digestion, lymphatic system, skin and mental health. PRD can be defined as symptoms starting or continuing 3 months or more after the end of radiotherapy. Sometimes they may not start until many years or decades later. PRDA is a small UK charity whose objectives are to see that the effects of PRD are minimised, that people affected by PRD are given the best possible care and treatment, and that PRD is accepted as a serious problem and given the attention it deserves.

### PRDA aims to have an impact by:

- providing and facilitating direct support and information to people affected by, or at risk of, Pelvic Radiation Disease;
- providing a voice for people affected by PRD;
- influencing decision-makers to achieve adequate, dedicated funding for PRD services across the UK;
- working with charity, professional organisations, NHS and other partners to improve health and social services for people affected by PRD;
- working with charity and professional organisation partners to improve professional awareness and education on the prevention and treatment of PRD;
- influencing research and trials that address issues to do with PRD.

## Chairman's Welcome from Richard Surman



2019/20 has been a good year for PRDA. Dan Meehan undertook an extensive mailing to UK urologists, an important group of health professionals for us. We are very grateful to him for his hard work. We were able for the first time to have a significant presence at the British Society of Gastroenterologists Annual General Conference in Glasgow, during which we hosted a 'summit' of interested gastroenterologists and other health professionals. As a result of this summit, we now provide support to a group of healthcare professionals who are very focused on PRD and collaborating on issues such as education for doctors, clinical standards for PRD services as well as the creation of PRD research studies. All this of course in addition to the advice services that we provide for patients and health professionals.

2020 will see us taking big steps forward; it's a big transition year for us, as we aim to expand our trustee board and move to a new way of working. We launched an online forum this year and indications are that it is proving to be both popular and useful. The objective of the Forum is to be helpful to the many people who feel isolated and confused about PRD. Although we operate on a very tight budget, I am confident that we have full control over the charity's finances and are adapting our expenditure to allow for the financial uncertainties faced by ourselves and many other charities in the current circumstances.

We are also looking to bring more volunteers on board - this will mean more opportunities for patients, their families, friends and colleagues to get involved in helping PRDA to be the best charity for supporting people affected by PRD. - We exhibited at the British Society of Gastroenterology conference in Glasgow and spoke to over 150 professionals there;
- We mailed out to all Urologists in England, N. Ireland, Scotland and Wales;
- We reached 8068 (sessions) visitors worldwide through our website;
- We expanded our social media presence with over 78,000 Twitter and 1,600 Facebook Impressions, and joined LinkedIn;
- We sent out over 5,000 Newsletters to more than 400 subscribers.

# How we are here for people


All of the volunteers and staff at PRDA have some close experience of PRD. We understand the problems and how hard it can be to get vital information and support. We know there are big gaps in the system and we are dedicated to helping people affected by PRD, whether patients, family or carers, bridge those gaps and get appropriate and sympathetic treatment.

Our **Helpline** is at the heart of all that we do, talking to people with problems, helping them, and connecting with Healthcare Professionals. Our Medical Advisory Panel are there to advise when we need help with patient queries and when we write about PRD clinical issues. The panel has been considerably expanded this year and includes 7 gastroenterologists, 4 specialist nurses, 2 therapeutic radiographers, 2 clinical oncologists, 2 urologists, a physiotherapist, a dietitian and a GP.

## What we did with your money continued

We invested in a new **Fundraising Pack** which can be downloaded from our website. It contains a wealth of ideas which any supporter can use to help raise money for PRDA.



We updated and renewed our stock of the **leaflets** that we send out for people affected by PRD and for healthcare professionals. This major investment should give us enough to keep going for up to two years. We sent out around 3,500 leaflets this year, most of them posted out to clinics and hospitals.

We engaged a small consultancy, Colley Raine, to do some of our **marketing and fundraising**. They assisted in organising our event in Glasgow (see below), advised on marketing and social media, and rejuvenated our strategic fundraising efforts.

# Professional Engagement programme

## BSG Conference in Glasgow

In June 2019 we took an exhibition stand at the major British Society of Gastroenterology conference. Most of the Trustees were involved in manning the stand and we spoke to over 150 professionals. We also conducted a survey on how gastroenterology professionals talk about PRD – very few of them call it PRD so we know we have more work to do to raise awareness so that when professionals see 'radiation proctitis' they recognise that quite likely that person also has bladder, sexual and psychological problems.

We also organised a reception during the evening and brought together 25 professionals to discuss PRD and the headline issues in its treatment and educating professionals. Most of those attending agreed to continue meeting, and our PRD Professionals Group (PPG) was born. The group met again in London later in 2019.

The cost of our stand and the professionals meeting was partly funded by a generous gift from Penguins Against Cancer.

# Plans for next year and beyond

- We expect to bring in some additional clerical support to help with all of the above, and to help organise our volunteers and support group activities.
- We will continue to improve our website, and to expand our social media presence.
- We will support our PRD Professionals Group and help them develop a strong programme.
- We will increase our fundraising effort, and aim to grow our income as a result.

## Trustees' Report and Financial Statement

The Trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006 have the pleasure in presenting their report together with the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. All Trustees of the charity are also Directors of the charitable company, and *vice versa*. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Founded ten years ago as a patient support group and registered as a charity in 2012, the Trustees continue to dedicate themselves, with the support of volunteers, to expand the outreach of the Pelvic Radiation Disease Association (PRDA) and to further refine the charity's provision of information, support and guidelines to both patients and health professionals.

### Objectives and Activities

The term Pelvic Radiation Disease is a relatively new one, only now gaining some acceptance among health professionals as a valid and useful framework within which to describe brief or long lasting problems, mostly in the bowel, caused by pelvic radiotherapy. The trustees aim to bring this disease to the attention of health professionals and patients to inform them about how to alleviate their symptoms. The trustees work to have the most up to date information for patients on the various aspects of Pelvic Radiation Disease and available resources for treatment.

The objectives of the charity as per the Articles are:

- To campaign for the wider recognition of pelvic radiation disease as well as for improvement in National Health Service facilities and treatment to help the management of radiation induced surgery.
- To support patients suffering from radiation induced injury and in particular patients suffering from pelvic radiation disease in any appropriate way including through a network of informal support groups that are professionally supported.
- To gather information about and support research into pelvic radiation disease.

## Structure, Governance and Management

The Charity was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects of the charitable company, and is governed under its Articles of Association.

The charity is governed by the Board of six trustees, which meets on a regular basis. The secretary and the trustees manage all day to day operations of the charity and support and advise on all financial matters.

The charity is registered with the Fundraising Regulator.

### Trustees Recruitment and induction

Trustees receive written minutes at Board Meetings held during the year to ensure they are kept up to date with the activities of the charity. In addition, the trustees review the Pelvic Radiation Disease Association portfolio of policies and procedures on a regular basis, and introduce new policies and procedures as appropriate. A new policy on Safeguarding was agreed in 2019, and a Safeguarding Officer was appointed and trained.

The board intends to increase the number of trustees in the forthcoming year, not only to replace any who might step down, but also with the aim of making the board larger and increasing the skills and experience base for the greater benefit of the charity.

### **Related Parties**

The Charity has no subsidiaries. There are no related parties in the charity.

### Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operation and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that the systems are in place to mitigate their exposure to the major risks. Efforts are continuously made to increase funds. Internal risks are minimized by implementation of satisfactory operational procedures, and consistent quality of service delivery. These are reviewed by the Board on a regular basis.

PRDA does not hold any investments.

### Financial Review and Results

The trustees decided at the beginning of 2020 that the upturn in income in the previous two years should be turned to increased spending in the short term, even though that would mean the new year would result in a net deficit. The charity is run on the basis of very few ongoing financial commitments, and is in a position at any time to adjust the rate of its expenditure in response to its success in raising income. This flexibility and control makes it possible to budget for an annual deficit without the risk of committed outgoings gaining a momentum that would carry the charity into financial difficulties.

### **Financial Position**

The gross income of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020 amounted to £15,178 (2018/19: £26,233) whereas costs for charitable activities were £31,844 (2018/19: £19,219), of which Governance costs were £600 (2018/19: £840). The net deficit for the year was £16,666 (2018/19: surplus £ 7,014).

The overall net assets of the company have decreased from £61,262 to £44,596.

### Reserve Policy

It is the policy of the trustees to maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the charity, at the minimum level of £10,000.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Website - 33% on cost Computer equipment - 20% on cost

### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
